

How to Get Absentee Ballots for the December 11 Lansing Library Vote

*Only residents of the Lansing Central School District can vote in this referendum.
Out-of-town Lansing college students who are qualified voters can vote by absentee ballot in this referendum.*

Absentee ballot applications are available beginning Friday, Nov. 16 by contacting the school district Clerk, Jodie Rusaw between 12 PM and 4 PM.

Go to office at 264 Ridge Rd. (bldg. in front of elementary school) to pick up in person.
You can request an application by mail (send request to the Clerk, Jodie Rusaw, at 264 Ridge Road, Lansing, NY 14882).

Or phone the office at 533-3020 extension 4000 to ask that an application be sent to you.

Completed applications must be received by the Clerk by 4 PM on Dec. 4 if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or by 4 PM on Dec. 10th if the ballot is to be issued to the voter in person.

The ballot itself must be received by the Clerk no later than 5 PM on Dec. 11th.

In short:

1. You get an application.
2. Fill it out; mainly just your name and address.
3. Return the application and a ballot will be mailed to you or you can pick up the ballot in person.
4. Vote by ballot and return the ballot to the Clerk.

Please, get your absentee ballot to vote for the library resolution and candidates for its Board of Trustees, if you are going to be out of town.

How the Lansing Library resolution will look in the voting booth or on the absentee ballot:

School District Library Resolution #1

Question: Shall the Lansing Community Library Center be permanently established as a school district library for the benefit and free use of all residents of the Lansing Central School District, such library to have nine Library Board Trustees, whose members are elected by the voters of the School District for terms of up to five years, and be authorized to raise \$105,310.00, separate and apart from the annual School District budget, to support and maintain such library, said appropriation shall be raised annually by a tax upon the taxable property of said School District and shall be an annual appropriation thereafter until changed by further vote of the majority of electors of the Lansing Central School District, and shall be levied and collected yearly as are other general taxes? Nine vacancies are to be filled on the Library Board of Trustees. The nine candidates (out of 10 who are running) receiving the highest number of votes each will be elected to five-year terms.

Here is a notice about the vote concerning the Lansing Library. Voting takes place tomorrow, TUESDAY, DECEMBER 11 from 12 noon to 9 p.m. at the Lansing Middle School. Please vote YES to keep this library open! A library with a completed paid for and recently renovated building is a terrific asset for the Lansing community.

I've attached some information about the vote, and on the reverse side is a list of the candidates for the library trustees. This library will cost each household a small tax per year (15 cents per \$1000 property valuation) and this tax CANNOT be changed without another vote.
